We were overjoyed to host our official April 10th Ribbon Cutting Ceremony to unveil the new gymnasium to our community. With over 200 spectators, Superintendent Dr. Stecken, Board of Education President Ron Frye, Vice President Sara Olson, Secretary Rich Hamilton, Board Member Joe Johnson, Board Member Cory Yandell, Board Member Jason Eltrevoog, and Board Member Tiffany Biros proudly cut the ribbon and ushered in a new era at Seneca High School. At that event, we also officially revealed the brand name "THE SHIPYARD SHOWDOWN HOLIDAY BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT" which will debut on December 26th, 2024, in the new gym. Credit to Mr. Levi Maierhofer for the great design: No doubt this addition will be a source of great pride for the community, hosting a 16-team basketball tournament that will bring in revenue for restaurants, gas stations, and other local businesses. Seneca High School will also be hosting summer basketball and volleyball shootouts, wrestling tournaments, and other guest speaker appearances in this new addition. A large thank you to Shales McNutt Construction Management and Wold Architects & Engineers for their design and delivery, but also to the local contractors like Vissering Construction, Block Electric, S&K Excavating, and others who were critical players in the process. We have a long-awaited addition ready for unique and amazing ingame experiences that can be viewed this fall in volleyball season and throughout the years to come.

Information Letter from Social Worker, Samantha Leake:

Seneca High School continues its dedication to supporting our students and families. In the '23-'24 school year, we continued to develop new programs to meet the basic needs and social-emotional well-being of our students. As research consistently demonstrates, social-emotional learning (SEL) is not just important; it is essential for all students. It forms the basis of an individual's academic and overall life success, enhancing self-awareness,

academic engagement and achievement, positive behavior, and prosocial behaviors both in and out of the classroom. SEL also plays a crucial role in improving mental health. This year, we introduced the Behavior Intervention Monitoring Assessment System-2 (BIMAS-2), a research-based screening tool. This tool is a significant step in our commitment to student well-being, as it helps identify students who may benefit from additional social and emotional support and interventions, thereby ensuring all our students can thrive academically. Also, in the '23-'24 school year, the Irish Care Closet continued to grow and thrive; we implemented our 1st annual Thanksgiving basket program and continued growing community partnerships like Packs for Pals. In addition to the Packs for Pals program during the school year, we are going into our second summer offering the Packs for Pals summer program that is implemented by SHS staff and housed at West Campus. SEL Interventions With the administration of the BIMAS SEL screener, we were able to implement new interventions this school year to address social and emotional needs. The first intervention that was introduced this school year is WORTH lessons, which were created by the Arukah Institute of Healing. Twice a week, Mrs. Rockrohr and I, as well as Lucky, the SHS therapy dog, would join Mrs. Foster's freshmen Student and Career Success class, which all our freshmen students are required to take. These lessons involve watching a video, students breaking out into small group discussions, and then having a big group discussion as a class. Some of these topics include friendships, bullying, the dangers of vaping, anxiety, depression, resilience, coping tools, etc. Another successful intervention we introduced this year is the SEL groups. Parents/guardians had the option to enroll their child in these groups, which were conducted once a week with Mrs. Holman and I, as well as Lucky, the SHS therapy dog. The focus of these groups was to develop all five of the SEL CASEL competencies: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making skills. Through a series of interactive activities and discussions, the group aimed to equip students with skills that they can apply within the academic environment to enhance their social skills and academic performance. The success of these groups is evident in the positive changes we've seen in the students' behavior, their increased ability to cope independently with uncomfortable emotions, their social skills, and their increased academic engagement. Thanksgiving Basket Program This year, we proudly introduced the first annual Thanksgiving basket program! This initiative, a testament to the positive culture of SHS, the Seneca Way, and overall strong Irish Pride, delivered a message of hope and solidarity, extending our support beyond the confines of our school. With the collective effort of SHS staff, students, and community members, we were able to provide complete Thanksgiving meals to 35 families, equaling 144 individuals! We are excited to continue this program in the future.

Abatement Process information from CSBO, Stacey Gould:

In early May, the Business Office at Seneca Township High School received the annual LaSalle and Grundy County Tax Extensions. The purpose of this section of the newsletter is to inform the taxpayers of Seneca Township High School District #160 of our annual abatement process. Every year, schools throughout the state of Illinois, including Seneca High School, present their tax levy at the December Board of Education meeting. This past year marked the beginning of a new five-year agreement with Constellation (formerly Exelon). Within this agreement, the taxable value of LaSalle station was agreed upon at \$530 million, putting the District in the position to once again decrease your tax rate to \$1.70838. You can see the history of our tax rates in the table below:

This process of abatement occurred after receiving the annual extensions from both LaSalle and Grundy Counties this past month. New Addition to SHS, Lucky. Article written by School Psychologist, Mrs. Jill Rockrohr:

Seneca High School is proud to introduce our newest "staff member," Lucky. Lucky is a nine month-old English Doodle who joined our district in January 2024. We were fortunate to obtain Lucky as a therapy dog in training through the United Way of Eastern LaSalle County. Through their Paw Pals program, this organization covers much of the costs associated with Lucky, including 18-24 months of weekly training to become a certified therapy dog. Research supports a strong link between animals and mental health/wellness. Therapy dogs specifically have been shown to significantly buffer the perceived stress of children and teens. Therapy dogs also have been shown to reduce social and separation anxiety in children and teens. Improvements in students' mood, emotional- and self-regulation skills, learning engagement, school attendance, connectedness, confidence, and motivation have all been demonstrated as well. Lucky has settled right into the SHS community this spring. She attends the Student and Career Success classes weekly and also participates in counseling and social thinking groups. Lucky is a regular visitor to both our Resource classroom and our Life Skills program. She is also available daily to work with our school counselors and school social worker to support students experiencing emotional distress. As Lucky grows and continues her training, we plan to incorporate students into assisting

with her daily care as well. Students and staff alike have embraced Lucky's presence and regularly visit her "home base" in the main office for a quick mood-booster. We are so grateful to the SHS administration, SHS Board of Education, and the United Way of Eastern LaSalle County for the opportunity to be a part of the Paw Pals program!

Transition English Article written by English Instructor, Mrs. Rebecca Liberatore:

To ensure our students are college and career-ready, Seneca High School will soon be elevating our current senior level English IV course to a Transitional English course, which is an ISBE, Illinois Community College Board, and Illinois Board of Higher Education approved course that aligns with Illinois' learning standards. Transitional English will focus heavily on the reading, writing, analysis, and critical thinking skills a student needs to be successful in the postsecondary world. Earning a C or higher in Transitional English in both semesters senior year suggests strong preparation for college-level writing and exceptional metacognitive skills, providing students with the opportunity to secure college-level placement in their writing and communication courses the following school year. The course will be divided into four thematic units, each containing a revised formal essay as the cumulative assessment. During the first semester, which includes unit one and unit two, Transitional English students will focus on developing and fine-tuning their analytical writing skills with a critical analysis essay of their community and a rhetorical analysis essay of a provided nonfiction text. Then, launching into the second semester with units three and four, students will shift gears into argumentation and the research process with an essay that defends a stance using analysis of several provided documents and an argumentative research essay. Crafting essays will be completed through the writing process of prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing with an additional revision of one essay during the final exam in both semesters; moreover, all units will be supplemented with college-level vocabulary, writing, and grammar activities plus transferable writing and communication activities such as discussions, letters, speeches, and professional emails. Ultimately, adding Transitional English will boost the English department's rigor and strengthen the school's continuously expanding college -prep and college-level offerings. Thus, with the intention of equipping our high school graduates with the vital literacy, communication, and composition skills needed for college and the workforce, Seneca High School aims to implement Transitional English during the 2024 to 2025 school year.

Healthcare Information from our Nurse, Taylor Neurohr:

As the healthcare industry rapidly evolves, Seneca High School's Allied Health department transforms to keep up with the changes. Exciting adaptations in college readiness and

technology in my courses have led to improvements in student's learning and the school as a whole. The addition of a College and Career Pathway Endorsement for the 2024-2025 school year and 11 brand new AEDs throughout the district keep SHS at the forefront of advancements. College and Career Pathway Endorsement This year, I assisted Principal Coughlin with the development of a College and Career Pathway Endorsement (CCPE) for the Nursing Assistant students. The program is approved by the Illinois State Board of Education to begin in the 2024-2025 school year. The CCPE framework includes an individualized learning plan, a career-focused instructional sequence, and professional learning opportunities. Students follow a path of coursework to earn early college credit in the Allied Health field. Current offerings in my classroom include Certified Nursing Assistant, Introduction to Nutrition, and Terminology of the Health Field. Together, all three classes are worth 11 college credits. Students also explore different careers and build a resume throughout their time at SHS. The program includes real -life application through at least 60 cumulative hours of paid or credit-supervised career development experience. Forty of those hours come from clinicals in the Nursing Assistant class at Pleasant View Lutheran, a skilled nursing facility in Ottawa. In class, they will also participate in two teambased challenges with adult mentors in the field, one being our own School Social Worker, Mrs. Leake. The program is career-focused and allows the students to gain essential employability skills such as critical thinking, work ethic, professionalism, communication, collaboration, interpersonal skills, and problem-solving. Students who pursue the CCPE will graduate from SHS with a diploma that displays a stamped endorsement in Health Sciences and Technology. New Automatic External Defibrillators In February, a team of myself, Athletic Trainer Chris Jackson, School Resource Officer Ken Sangston, and Chief School Business Official Stacey Gould, met representatives from Zoll to plan and update our Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) at SHS. An AED is used to help those in cardiac arrest by analyzing the heart's rhythm and delivering an electrical shock, if necessary, to essentially reset the heart. The 11 brand new Zoll AED 3s now means that we are standardized across the district for emergency readiness. One new enhanced feature is Real CPR Help, including voice and text prompts on an LCD screen. Its real-time feedback gives instructions on compression rate and depth, helping rescuers administer high-quality CPR. The monitoring of CPR quality is arguably one of the most significant advances in recent practice. The standardization ensures that faculty and staff feel confident in their ability to use the machines in emergency situations that are low-incident, but high-stakes. Education is completed annually with faculty, staff, and my Nursing Assistant students.

Mrs. Neimann, we cannot thank you enough for your time and dedication you have given Seneca High School over the course of your career. Mr. Applebee has supervised countless hours, built many Homecoming floats and coached hundreds of kids in Summer league Baseball in the community. Mr. Applebee has made such a positive impact for so many students and staff at Seneca High School over his career. Mr. Applebee's leadership, service and commitment to Seneca High School, your colleagues, staff, students and community has been amazing. Update from the Guidance Office:

Career exposure is absolutely essential so that high school students can make important decisions about which high school classes to take, which extracurricular activities to get involved in, and what work-based learning opportunities are needed to help with their career plan. With this in mind, the Seneca High School guidance counselors have provided students with career exploration opportunities both online and in-person. Over the school year, students have used the online Naviance website to complete interest inventories and personality inventories in order to help identify possible future careers. For in-person activities, students participated in career expos, a Reality Store activity, fairs, field trips, and open house events. In October, a group of students attended the ComEd Career Day in Hoffman Estates to learn about all of the different careers available at Exelon. The CEO of Exelon even addressed the students as he discussed the company and its many successes. Every year in October, Illinois Valley Community College (IVCC) hosts an event for LaSalle County schools to learn more about manufacturing jobs. As part of this event, students were able to tour Constellation's LaSalle Generating Station's training facility where they were able to learn more about the different jobs that are available at

Constellation. Then, the students went to IVCC to learn more about the education needed to get a career started in the manufacturing industry in the area. Also in October, the counselors took a group of interested students to the training center in Wilmington for the Operating Engineers Local 150 where they were able to tour the facility and have some hands-on experiences. In November, the sophomore class participated in the Reality Store. This activity helps students to learn about all of the expenses that adults have when living on their own or with a spouse and family. Near the beginning of second semester, in February, all students were able to attend a college fair held at Seneca High School that not only included colleges, but also tech schools and military branches. For students who wanted to learn more about union careers, the counselors took students to IVCC for the Union Apprenticeship Expo for an opportunity to listen to representatives speak about how to become an apprentice within their union. At the end of April, Seneca High School hosted a career fair for all SHS students. We had around 36 local businesses and industries that participated. The students were able to go to each table and speak with each representative. Some were able to apply for jobs, while others learned what education and experience is needed for careers within their company. To finish the school year, in May, a small group of students attended the Dresden Career Day at the Dresden Generating Station run by Constellation. Using a scavenger hunt set-up, students went around the training facility learning about the different careers and participating in hands-on activities.
