"The Seneca Way"

Years ago, the Seneca Township High School Board of Education passed its district mission based upon **The Seneca Way,** to prepare and support ALL STUDENTS for success and post-high school opportunities through a challenging, rewarding, and engaging educational program, while developing Irish Pride.

In that vein, we are excited by the work the administration has completed to earn the district's first **College & Career Pathway** in **Health Sciences.** Our district nurse, Mrs. Taylor Neurohr, has been instrumental in helping Seneca High School health science students earn up to 14 Illinois Valley Community College (IVCC) Dual Credit hours in nursing. Principal Mike Coughlin shared, "Our daughters were lucky, like many others at SHS, to have caring teachers, and opportunities to balance high quality classroom instruction with many hours of on-the-job experience. They were ready for a CNA job or the opportunity to pursue a bachelor's degree in nursing on their graduation day. Kudos to SHS for providing such a valuable opportunity!" Additionally, we are excited that our students have the opportunity to benefit from the work of our mathematics department. The creation of our vocational math class has offered students real-life practical math problems & skills to use in trades, such as concrete finishing, wood framing, cabinet and countertop installation, landscape work, etc.

From earning dual credits or taking remedial courses to eliminate having to take "0" hour classes at the next level, our students are benefitting from multiple forms of meaningful math instruction. According to high school mathematics teacher Mr. Brian Holman, "Our dual credit math programs at SHS span from Algebra 3, which offers a student transcript code to guarantee enrollment in "for credit" classes at colleges in Illinois, all the way to Calculus 1 which is the highest-level class that high school students are able to test into. This wide range of classes gives every junior and senior options for math classes that suit their future academic needs if they wish to pursue education past the high school level."

Offering meaningful educational opportunities for our students is a critical piece of *The Seneca Way* that we are proud to showcase through our programming.

Seneca High School is excited to offer a new College & Career Pathway to their students during the 24 - 25 school year. The Healthcare pathway has been approved by the State Board of Education for the 24 - 25 school year. Each student completing the Health Sciences (Certified Nursing Assistant) will have an individual plan, which includes college planning linked to early understanding of career goals, financial aid, resume building and a personal statement. Mrs. Neurohr recently shared with the Seneca High School board of Education a summary of the Healthcare pathway. Students will have the opportunity to create an individual plan that addresses preparation activities, career exploration, at least two years of coursework, which will include 14 college credit hours and hands-on experience. Students are currently finishing up their clinical work at the Ottawa Pavilion.





College and Career Pathway Endorsements

What are College and Career Pathway Endorsements?

The state of Illinois' Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness Act includes a process for school districts to award a College and Career Pathway Endorsement (CCPE) to high school graduates. Students have the opportunity to earn endorsements by completing an individualized learning plan, a career-focused instructional sequence, and professional learning opportunities.

Seneca High School students who meet the requirements will earn a seal on their diplomas that recognizes their commitment to their particular pathway and program of study. Through CCPE, a student gains essential employability and technical competencies in their identified sector.

The Framework

INDIVIDUAL PLAN

Each student completing an endorsement must have an individualized plan, which includes college planning linked to early understanding of career goals, financial aid, resume, and personal statement.

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING


Awareness, exploration, and preparation activities that provide opportunities for students to interact with adults in their workplace.

CAREER-FOCUSED INSTRUCTIONAL SEQUENCE

Two years of secondary coursework, or equivalent competencies, that articulate to a postsecondary credential with labor market value. Must include at least 6 hours of early college credit.

ACADEMIC READINESS

Ready for non-remedial coursework in reading and math by high school graduation through criteria defined by district and local community college.



Which Pathway Endorsements are being offered currently?

Seneca High School is offering an endorsement in Health Sciences and Technology with plans to add more in coming years. The following list has the endorsement area, specific pathway, and classes needed to fulfill the dual credit portion requirements for students to earn the endorsement on their high school diploma.

What outside classroom experience is required for the CNA Pathway?

Of the required 60 hours of work based learning required, 40 hours will be met through clinicals in the Certified Nursing Assistant Course. An additional 20 hours will need to be completed outside of school. Hours must be a related supervised career developmental experience in the Healthcare field with a professional skills assessment.

All students must turn in their hours and assessment to their Guidance counselor and Principal prior to the last Friday in May of the current school year.


From the Desk of Mr. O'Boyle, Athletic Director

Because YOU are WORTH it!

Over the past several years, the need for social-emotional learning opportunities has become increasingly evident. Such programs focus on developing students' ability to recognize and manage their emotions, establish positive relationships, make responsible decisions, and navigate the challenges of everyday life. By fostering these essential life skills, we can support academic and social growth to prepare students for success after high school.

Last year, Mrs. Leake and I began participating in WORTH, a teen program through the Arukah Institute of Healing in Princeton, Illinois. This program addresses mental health and substance use in teens through the use of short, weekly videos on various topics. Videos use age-appropriate themes to connect with teens on important topics that affect self-worth, with a tagline of "because YOU are WORTH it." Included in the lesson are discussion questions to further each topic.

Mrs. Leake and I, joined by Lucky the therapy dog, visit each of Mrs. Foster's Student & Career Success classes weekly to present the WORTH lesson to freshman students. During the first semester, we covered a variety of topics, including healthy habits, relationships, resilience, coping skills, and the dangers of vaping. Students were broken into small groups for discussion, with a spokesperson from each group nominated to share their group's thoughts with the class. Many topics generated a lively discussion, such as identifying red and green flags in relationships.

To wrap up our first semester classes, Mrs. Leake and I asked students to write down one thing they learned through the weekly WORTH lessons. Each student contributed, with a variety of responses, including breathing techniques, growth versus fixed mindset, and many coping strategies. Student feedback indicated that students enjoy the weekly lessons and feel that they are beneficial for helping them to cope with everyday stressors. Mrs. Leake and I plan to continue this program through second semester with the new Student & Career Success classes. Thank you to Mrs. Foster for allowing us to visit each week.


